Dissertation Abstract

My dissertation aims to make the case for a “mitigated Pyrrhonian” reading of Kant’s critical philosophy, according to which Pyrrhonian skepticism can be employed as a means to knowledge. Many common interpretations of Kant’s views on philosophical skepticism hold that he intended to refute all forms of skepticism, which I argue comes from a conflation of Cartesian skepticism with other forms of skepticism. I show that Kant, far from aiming to refute Pyrrhonian skepticism, firmly endorsed Pyrrho’s method in the *Lectures on Logic*. I argue that Kant made a sharp distinction between the “skeptical method” of Pyrrho and the austere, dogmatic form of skepticism which he aimed to refute; that he understood Pyrrho to have been a moderate skeptic, who aimed to use doubt as a means to reach knowledge; and that various elements of his account of Pyrrhonian skepticism in the *Lectures on Logic* find their way into the works of the critical period in a number of surprising ways. I then proceed by examining various points of contact between Kant and Pyrrho in the *Critique of Pure Reason*, and in the final chapter, conclude with a discussion of the shared “skeptical method” which he attributes to himself in the *Critique of Pure Reason* and to both Hume and Pyrrho in the *Lectures on Logic*.
